District Lead Volunteer Report 2025

It's no exaggeration that 2025 flew by. We began in the middle of the Volunteering Experience transformation, adopting new teams, titles and ways of working. The new system "hangover" and settling into the structure affected the early months, so thank you to everyone for sticking with it and to the district team for helping me smoothing out the kinks in the structure. From the 2026 vantage point, the membership system is markedly better (though not perfect) and HQ continue to improve it.

2025 also started with the sad news that Margaret Tyler MBE, a stalwart of Croydon Scouting and its precursor districts, had passed away. Many scouting friends attended her remembrance service, and Margaret is sorely missed. I know several groups also had members "gone home" too and we remember their service to Scouting with gratitude.

In the first half of the year, the July "Safety Training" deadline was a source of concern, but over 95% of our adult volunteers completed the updated training on time – so thank you everyone for making the time, and thanks to the DLT for the support and encouragement to get this done.

There were some changes to the district team in 2025: Mandy Giles (co-Programme Lead and former ADC Cubs) moved to a scouting role closer to home in Sutton, and we welcomed Aiden Neal as District Youth Lead and Kirsten Eeles as Support Team Leader.

In November we held "Croydon Scouts: Connect", welcoming 100+ volunteers to an afternoon of sectional sessions, interest workshops and a busy marketplace. Huge thanks to everyone who made it happen. We plan three adult events each year: a spring skills day, a summer social, and Connect each autumn.

You'll read below about the fantastic activities across our groups, units and district teams, so I won't repeat them here, but a personal highlight was our first district Squirrels event – a brilliant Neverland-themed day. Two new Squirrel dreys started in '25 (and more to come in '26). The programme team built a strong base in '25 and are now delivering a fantastic '26 programme.

Our membership increased in '25, with youth membership up 3% (mainly Cubs and Scouts). Explorers held steady, whilst our 14–24 team revived the "Romans" Network unit, leading to their first camp at the start of '26. Beavers is currently down, the second year in a row – this is a concern, but reflects a national trend. Squirrels grew by a whopping 40% (but from 48-67!)

As you can see, we have built momentum in 2025, but this is still being delivered by a small number of people. The "District" is not a separate, distinct body of people: almost everyone on our district teams also holds at least one, and often more, group or unit role(s) – and so we need more district volunteers. We'd particularly welcome new members in the programme team, and we also have two specific roles in our support team – a marketing coordinator, and a district quartermaster. Please do speak to Chris or Kirsten if either of these roles would interest you or you'd like to suggest someone else, or any of the district team about how you could be involved.

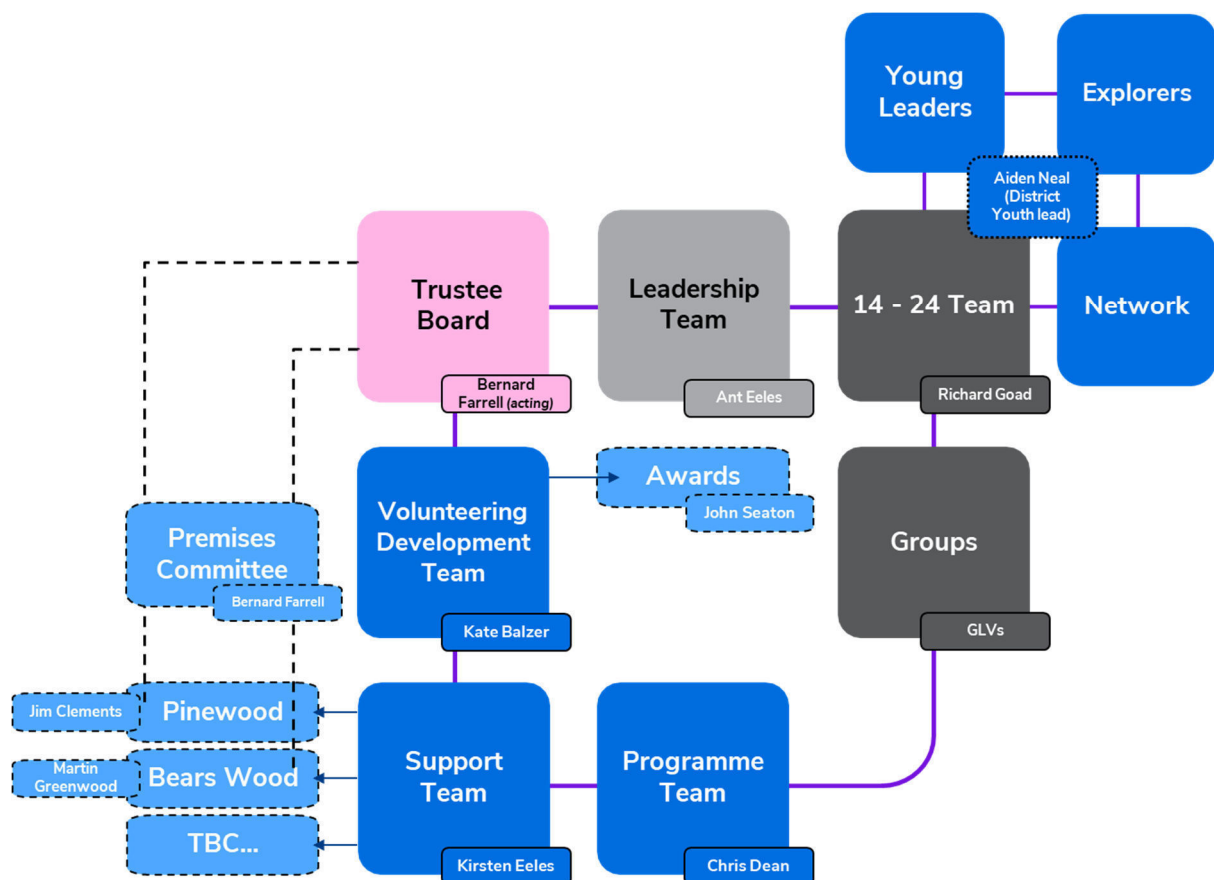

District Youth Lead Report 2025

I took on the role of District Youth Lead in June 2025 and have since focused on supporting and strengthening youth involvement across Croydon Scouts. Over the past year, I have worked to build connections with different sections and better understand how young people are currently engaged within the District.

A key part of this has been attending and supporting a range of district events. This has included visiting Patrol Leader Training, where it was encouraging to see young people developing their leadership skills, and the Adkin Challenge, which showcased teamwork, resilience, and the enthusiasm of our members. These visits have provided valuable insight into the strengths of our current provision and opportunities to further embed youth-shaped Scouting.

Looking ahead, my focus for the coming year is to continue increasing youth voice across all sections, ensuring that young people are given meaningful opportunities to shape their Scouting experience. This will include further engagement with section events, supporting youth forums, and building on the momentum created through the relaunch of the Network.

Overall, the second half of 2025 has been a positive start in the role, with strong foundations in place to continue developing youth-led Scouting across Croydon in the year ahead.

District Programme Team Report 2025

The past year has been one of adjustment to the new District Team structure, which in some respect is still work in progress and ongoing. The Team has 15 members, many of whom were part of the previous District Team. Adapting to the new world of Transformation has been a major challenge and perhaps not entirely to everyone's taste.

Early on the Team decided to adopt a cluster system in which several Groups are supported by two or three Team members. For some clusters this is working well but for others not so well and we are aware of this. The Team has met broadly every other month. From January through to September the focus was on delivering the programme of District activities agreed before Transformation leaving the last four months of the year for us to plan ahead for 2026. This has been quite challenging for us too as we try to introduce new activities for all sections without culling the old favourites. We have tried to provide more for the Squirrels, Beavers and Cubs, but we really need input from section leaders in order for this to take hold. As mentioned above there are only 15 of us and 11 have other roles in Scouting. If in reading this you think you can help please speak to me. 2026 will be our busiest year yet so it will be all hands on deck.

I am sure that our DLV will wish to comment on the Census results. Overall, youth membership is up by 1.6 % which is good news. Conversely the drop in Beaver numbers and the persistently high numbers on waiting lists are causes for some concern.

Finally, may I thank all of my Team for their diligence and commitment sometimes under a certain amount of stress.

Growth and Membership:

Scout Section Report 2025

The Scout section enjoyed another very busy and active year in 2025.

In March, 8 troops from Croydon took part in the **County Night Hike**. It was an incident night hike starting and finishing at Bentley Copse. Congratulations to 16th Purley and 7th Purley who jointly took 2nd place. With 42 teams from across the County this was a great result.

Also in March, we had our **Cub/Scout Linking Day** at Bears Wood. The aim was to give older cubs a taster of what to expect when they go up to the Scout Troop. 102 young people took part. Everyone seemed to have a great time taking part in the activities of knife skills, axe and saw skills, task master, pioneering chariots, fire lighting and 1st Aid.

We had a full 25 teams for **Checkpoint Challenge** on 18th May. Teams navigated their way around a 7-mile course, starting and finishing at Bears Wood. There were 8 checkpoint incidents to challenge their teamworking and scouting skills. Incidents included a non-verbal communication challenge, constructing a free-standing flagpole, identifying smells, a logic puzzle, fire lighting to burn through string, the ball in the bag game, a 'radioactive' ground problem solving challenge and a blindfolded minefield teamwork challenge. Teams also had a photo quiz and earned bonus points for carrying a Ryvita biscuit throughout the hike, unbroken. Final scores were very close-1st 11th Purley; 2nd 7/12th Croydon B; and 3rd 1st/27th Croydon.

Adkin 100 - the Adkin Camping Challenge. This was a highlight of the year. Over the last weekend in June, 12 teams from across the district took part in the Adkin Camping Challenge at Bears Wood. 2025 marked 100 years of Adkin. The trophy was first presented in 1925, and has run every year since, apart from 2 years of Covid lockdowns. They even ran it during the wartime years. It's a Patrol camping challenge for Scouts of all ages and abilities and challenges them to develop their patrol camping skills. The Patrol is provided with a camping area. They pitch their tents, cook for themselves, including sorting out their own cooking fires, and take part in some fun challenges. Each team were assessed against the Adkin bronze, silver and gold standards. 9 out of 12 teams achieved the gold standard and the rest got silver. Results were as follows: Adkin Trophy (Overall winner) 7th Purley Kestrels; Hicks Trophy (Team spirit) 11th Purley; Brass Peg (Most improved) 7/12 Croydon Birdwatchers and Golden Duck Trophy (Duckmaster Challenge) 1st Purley The un-named



In October a record 46 PLs and APLs attended the **PL Training Weekend** at The Fort in Dulwich. They learnt about what makes a good Patrol Leader, instructing others, teamwork, risk assessing activities and programme planning, running games amongst other things. Each of them took a turn at leading the Patrol they were in on an activity which included knife skills, fire lighting, making a promotional video and various teamwork challenges.

In September we ran a '**Little Camp**' at **Bears Wood** for those troops that don't manage to do much camping on their own. 3 troops took part in a back-to-basics weekend camp and enjoyed pioneering, axe and saw skills, games and some on-site activities.

Our annual **Wide Game** at Shirley Hills was due to be held in November but sadly, with a forecast of persistent heavy rain, it had to be postponed until March 2026. It's very rare that we need to postpone events but, as always, the safety of our young people and volunteers must come first.

None of these events would have been possible without lots of planning and organisation from our District Programme Team members and the help of the Troop Leaders and Young Leaders. A big thank you to all who helped at our events and to those scouters who give up their time every week providing valuable skills for life and lots of fun for the young people in the scout troops.

Explorer Section Report 2025

Croydon Explorers maintained our membership numbers similar to last year with 223 explorers, this consolidates the previous years increase with numbers not seen since 2014. Thank you to all the Explorer team for doing something right with our exciting and active programme.

Our numbers are reflected by a very active programme of activities. In February Explorers from Croham Valley, Kenley Aces, Seahorses and Young Leaders entered the Southern 50 competition with more teams entering the 50Km class, but unfortunately this year we didn't have any class winners, maybe next year.

In March Explorers from Kenley Aces, Seahorses and Croham Valley joined around 8000 other Explorers at the Monopoly Run, always a popular event with the young people. On a bitterly cold March evening most Croydon Units entered teams in Red Flare the overnight hiking/activity competition, but this time the cold was the biggest challenge, so congratulations to Seahorses coming 2nd.

In April the focus turns to Duke of Edinburgh and practice expeditions, all units had teams involved at all levels whether that was in North Wales for Gold or the Surrey hills for Bronze and Silver.

May/June we enter exam season with less trips but more activities such as wide games, make-up evenings, axe throwing or pizza making. Croham Valley did manage a weekend sail with the Discovery Project in late June on the Solant. And Kenley Aces had 2 evenings climbing near Forest Row. Seahorses made use of the long days (or short nights) for their regular sunset to sunrise walk.

July brings Camp preparation and opportunities for longer evenings. Seahorses and Kenley had a fantastic day at the Royal International Air Tattoo (RIAT) at RAF Fairford. And Kenley made contact with some Explorers from Quebec, undertaking volunteering with them on the City Commons, rowing the Queens barge Jubilant on the Thames and hosting them at the Military Music Spectacular at Horse guards along with Croham Valley and Seahorses. This year there was only 1 Croydon Explorer on the Explorer belt to Poland, hopefully more next year in Galica.

August saw Kenley and Croham Valley join for summer camp In the Lake District with 50 of us in 4 minibuses and van, having a fantastic time despite storm Floris delivering us some very strong winds putting a real strain on our tents. Purley Cross joined with the 29th Purley Troop for a trip to Alderney and seemingly had much more better stable weather.

September started off with thrills and spills for Seahorses who took part in the Theme Park Camp, always a tough one to get tickets for, lucky them.

October Croydon scouts were the main attendees on the GLSW hillwalking and climbing weekend in North Wales, we were blessed with some really good weather with all having a great day walking on the 1st day and for the 2nd day most having a fantastic day climbing on natural rock and others electing to walk again on a more challenging hill.

November and December all units tend to have activities in their HQ, with most getting into London to see the Christmas Lights, then finishing off the year with meals and parties.

We continue to be active with top awards with 1 Seahorse gaining their Explorer belt with a joint GLSW/Surrey team to Poland. The Explorer belt is a 10-day unsupported expedition to a foreign country undertaking tasks to learn about the land they travel through.

For Duke of Edinburgh in 2025 we gained 7 Bronze awards, 7 Silvers, but unfortunately no golds this year although some are very close, so 2026 hopefully will bring more.

Property and Premises Report 2025

This is probably the first report in this form covering the main areas above in our District

Elsewhere in the annual report you will read detailed reports on Bears Wood and Pinewood and you will see for yourselves what fantastic strides have been made at both sites.

I would like to touch on the work of the two crews who give up so much of their time and effort and in many cases their own finances to ensure that we in Croydon have two exceptional sites at our disposal. So to each and every one of you, many thanks on behalf of us all.

Our youth have access at much reduced rates than outside Scout Groups and a fraction of what non Scouting youth groups have to pay. The sites success can be measured in the level of usage from those prepared to pay a premium beyond the Croydon Rate in order to have some time at either.

The year (that's 2025) has seen a number of upgrades. Bears Woods traversing wall is a fantastic replacement for use of the old mobile climbing wall, and Pinewood is almost unrecognisable. Next year has a number of major upgrades in the pipeline.

Leases have been an issue and with Croydon Council holding seven and the Council parlous financial state. We have the Pinewood lease due for renewal and Bears Wood currently being held over and others in various states of time sensitivity.

Two leases we are trying to sort involve Groups which are either closed, closing, absorbed with and without tenants etc., etc. We are also involved with developers, builders and the Council over new builds and non-conforming built structures.

We promoted the Premises work book during the year to help Groups look at their own buildings, whether rented, leased or owned to make sure that the fabric was safe and it's use was in compliance. We will probably replay that again next year.

Meanwhile if you fancy a dabble in bricks, mortar and leases then join the group, no experience required, training given, effort expected.

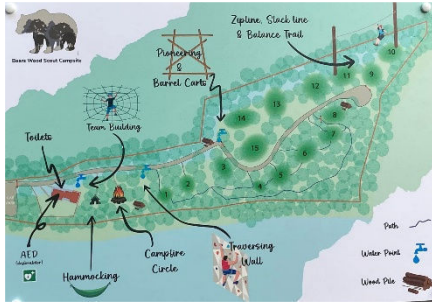

As I'm sure you can imagine running a site like Bears Wood is no easy task and each year we have to carry out all the same tasks as previous years. Some things never change, cleaning after groups have stayed, all the mowing of sites, trimming of hedges, cutting back of undergrowth etc. All this is carried out tirelessly by our regular volunteers Danny Curnyn, Brian Young, Richard Carrau, Steve French, John Seaton & Sean Weston, all of whom you probably know from many years of service to Croydon Scouting, along with Brian Smith and Dave Spaughton who come from outside of Scouting, but just want to give a little back to the community (and of course enjoy our company!!)



We can also call upon others when required, such as Leo Hawkins, who are always willing when not too busy working, to carry out specialist tasks. We also have very good relations with Howden Tree Care who look after our tree stock and help us with our Woodland Management Plan. Those of you who follow us on Facebook will no doubt have seen many of these tasks, and more, reported on as they get carried out.



The other contributors to the maintenance of the site, to whom we are very grateful, are the volunteers from Harold Stiles Williams who were on site for the third year running and helped to fully dismantle the old derelict archery range and clear the site; Pinewood Seahorses who carried out their annual leaf clearance and gutter cleaning amongst other tasks and Croydon Network who helped by moving hundreds of tyres from around the site down to the car park ready for collection by a specialist

disposal company.

The main reason we all do this is to make sure we have a great facility for the young people to take advantage of and it is great to report that Bears Wood is continuing to prove very popular, with bookings still very positive both in the indoor accommodation and groups camping. Not only local scout groups but many from further afield and numerous DofE groups stay overnight on expeditions. What is extremely encouraging is that not only are we getting many repeat bookings (which means we must be doing something right!!) but we continue to get enquiries, and subsequently bookings, from new groups, many of which are from further afield due to recommendations via word of mouth.

We have had the usual local scout groups along with ones from Dartford, Camberwell, Tadworth, Barnehurst to name just a few. Numerous school DofE bookings, school residentials, CCF Cadets and events for District Squirrel, Cub & Scout sections have been hosted too.

We had the pleasure of hosting the national SASU "Bush Scout" for their annual training weekend of Outdoor Practical Skills and Tomahawk Throwing again this year and will be doing so again next year.





In May we hosted a VE 80 Beacon ceremony which proved very successful with numerous dignitaries, MP Natasha Irons, Councillors Richard Catterjee and Lynne Hale and the Deputy Lieutenant Col. Ray Wilkinson in attendance showing their support for Bears Wood and Croydon Scouting.



So, as you can see Bears Wood continues to thrive and go from strength to strength, and long may it continue. My grateful thanks to all who make it possible (and popular) by their tremendous hard work and dedication.

Pinewood Scout Centre Report 2025

Pinewood continues to transform and the past year has seen huge improvements that have included most significantly, the conversion of the old, end of building tool and kayak stores into new year round, indoor bunk room accommodation that provides 28 x heavy duty, adult rated bunks across four rooms. Out in the grounds we have built new secure storage for the boats and equipment and opened up previously unused areas through the removal of invasive rhododendron that has enabled us to create a new natural pond, create boundary dead hedging and new wildlife habitat, plant new indigenous trees and significantly improve the biodiversity of the site. This work has continued with the lake which continues to improve in quality, but last summer saw four consecutive heat waves that seriously lowered the levels of water in the lake to a level where unfortunately we had to suspend water activities. We're in regular dialogue with our neighbouring golf courses to consider ways to improve ground water levels but are reliant on rainfall so hopefully last year was the exception and not our new norm!

In addition to all the structural transformations, the past year saw us start a supporting communications push, to significantly increase awareness of Pinewood and its facilities across the Region and wider community. This has complimented the District Support Team social media work and has directly seen an increase in inquiries and bookings from Groups from outside District. This increased awareness has also led to the increase in interest in volunteering on our Thursday team days and a dedicated effort to engage the District Network members, to support Explorer Belt and other community based projects, alongside providing a purposeful way to continue with the Scouting movement.

This approach has also led to the commission of a highly successful Prisons & Probation Service Community Pay Back Project. This Project is onsite on a Wednesday and provides free, essential labour to accelerate many of our projects across the site, most notably the clearing of rhododendron, construction of dead hedges, indoor painting, relocation of stores and the paving of the archery range to make it wheelchair accessible. The feedback from the Project has been incredibly positive and seen the Project evolve into a weekly event that the participants actively look forward to as it provides meaningful, purposeful work, while supporting the mental and physical health of the participants through immersion in nature and experiencing the unique environment that Pinewood provides.

These transformations form part of a structured five year programme, that is, thanks to the Community Payback and voluntary efforts, ahead of schedule and as we move into year five, we aim to create new woodland camping areas and improve the facilities around the lake. There's still much to do but the team continues to grow in size, enthusiasm and capability and is always happy to accommodate new joiners regardless of experience or ability.



Pinewood is an amazing District asset that has special rates for Croydon Groups, so if you've not experienced it or seen what we've done get in touch and come along as we think that you'll be impressed.
